make (a statement or situation) less confused and more clearly comprehensible. melt (butter) in order to separate out the impurities.

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ORIGIN Middle English (in the senses [set forth clearly] and [make pure and clean]): from Old French **clarifier**, from late Latin **clarificare**, from Latin **clarus** 'clear.'

MAKE CLEAR, shed/throw light on, elucidate, illuminate; EXPLAIN, explicate, define, spell out, clear up.
antonym confuse.

PURIFY, refine; filter, fine.

To *explain* is to make a verbal attempt to justify certain actions or to make them understood.
To *construe* is to make a careful interpretation of something, especially where the meaning is ambiguous.



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
